



1. INTRODUCTION

Terracotta pots are natural, porous products that are ideal for growing plants indoors, on balconies, and in gardens. For safe and long-lasting use, please follow the instructions below.



2. INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE

- Check the pot for any damage before use.
- Place the pot on flat, stable surfaces to prevent it from tipping over.
- Arrange the soil and plant evenly in the pot to keep it stable.
- If necessary, use a suitable saucer to prevent water pooling on the floor.
- Do not place the pot on delicate surfaces without protection (felt pads, rubber discs, mats) to avoid damage.
- If the pot is placed on balconies, parapets, or shelves, secure it with appropriate brackets, protective frames, or plant holders to prevent accidental falls.



3. SAFETY WARNINGS

- Always handle with care. Terracotta can chip or break even from minor impacts.
- Wear gloves when handling the pot to avoid abrasions or cuts from small chips.
- If the pot contains plants or is very heavy, move it with two or more people.
- · Keep out of reach of children and pets.
- Use only with adult supervision, if necessary.
- Do not drill or modify the pot in ways that might cause sudden breakage.
- Not suitable for contact with food.



4. MAINTENANCE

- If possible, keep the pot sheltered during cold months to prevent frost damage.
- Prevent water from pooling, as it can freeze and break the terracotta.
- Do not subject the pot to sudden temperature changes (e.g., do not pour ice-cold water into a pot that has been exposed to strong sunlight).



5. DISPOSAL

- If broken, wear protective gloves, collect the fragments, and wrap them in paper/cardboard to prevent accidental cuts.
- Ceramic fragments can be disposed of according to local regulations as inert or non-recyclable waste.
